Meet Linnea Sarantopoulos

Linnea graciously agreed to be interviewed on a lastminute basis. However, my first attempt at contact had challenges with email and phone, and we were not able to connect. But timing is everything, and I believe

we are exactly where we belong, doing just what we choose to do, with the very person we are supposed to be doing it with!

I have said it before - most members I speak with don't know how their story can help anyone else. They often wonder if the things they do have an impact on the world. Well, I can tell you this - your life matters, nothing happens by accident, and every time you help someone, it has a ripple effect. This is the story of an individual who has had a major impact on her community!

Linnea grew up in a Finnish and Swedish family of new immigrants. Her family in the United

States was small, consisting of Linnea, her parents, a brother, and an aunt. When she married into a large Greek family, her extended family expanded to include her husband's ten siblings, nieces, nephews, aunts, and uncles. "I spoke fluent Finnish at home, and the culture was very much shared with the close community and the children," reflects Linnea. "I had been around people from the old country where going something was always on celebrations and gatherings, so marrying into a large family was great."

They went on to have two sons - Christian, an attorney, and Gregory, an electrical engineer, both of whom are civic-minded, volunteering for the town and schools. Both are also musical, having played classic piano since the age of 8 years. Grandchildren round out the family, so what once started off small has grown significantly, bringing a tremendous amount of joy.

"I have always been involved in civic activities but had little time to do much while working and raising a family," recalled Linnea. "In 1964, I graduated from Simmons College and married, starting my career as a Home Economics Teacher at Ellis Tech." That summer, Linnea worked with the Head Start Program and ran a Nursery School with little experience beyond the years she taught Sunday School as a young woman. In 1965, she was hired by the Killingly Junior High School, moving to Killingly Intermediate School later in her career.

"My first real civic involvement was the Northeast Cancer Crusaders in 1988. I was still working, but Arlene [Baril] and I worked closely with a great team, and we successfully fundraised quite a bit of money," she exclaimed. When Linnea was diagnosed with breast cancer in 1989, she realized how important her local hospital and effective treatment were to her recovery.

In 2008, Arlene (already a member) invited Linnea to join the Woman's Board of DKH and its Fundraising Committee. Together, they applied the fundraising skills they had developed while working with the Northeast Cancer Crusaders. "I wanted to raise funds from the community, and my first ever event involved hosting actor Brian Dennehy for a 'Stew and Story' fundraiser," Linnea remembers. "And it was successful, with the expenses covered by sponsors."

"Besides my family, my Woman's Board pride and joy is the Valentine Dinner Dance in February. We started with these ideas, and at the time, there was not much support for it. We decided to forge ahead with it, selling ads, and acquiring community support. We held it at Wright's Mill in a roaring snowstorm, raising \$9,600. In 2014, the Dinner Dance was held at Stonehurst, raising \$14,000," Linnea proudly shared.



"Since then I have been working as part of a trio: Arlene, Cheryl [Medlyn], and I have been coming up with new ideas and expanding our Committee," said Linnea. During the COVID-19 pandemic, it was even more essential to think up creative ways to fundraise. "Cheryl Medlyn

created the Christmas Wreath Fundraiser, Heidi Hare the Cash Calendar Raffles. Debbie Cornman is invaluable at putting together the Newsletter, Jane Bullock and the Committee take the reins on the Golf Tournament, and Valentine has been steering the Woman's Board in a good direction with her community contacts and knowledge of marketing and social media. Sometimes you need five or six members; other fundraising requires twelve or fourteen. The Woman's Board is blessed with so many members, too numerous to mention, who have their own special interest or expertise and who bring valuable contributions to our fundraising efforts. To those, I am grateful." In the future, Linnea imagines the Woman's Board will need to have more community involvement, not just the members, to continue to be successful.
